5. LOOKING BACK ON THE SUMMER WORKSHOPS

Paul and Sharon Benson attended their first PARCS workshop this past summer in Wakaw (and took out new memberships). They shared the report that they took back to their cottage community (the Hamlet of Spruce Grove) and we are sharing it with our readers.

The tradition of “going to the lake” has changed. Cottages are now more like a second home or even a principal residence.

Implications:

1. **Higher infrastructure demands** - This is noticeable in the growing need for better sewage systems. Resort communities are beginning to develop partnerships with neighbors to achieve the economy of scale needed to move forward toward lagoon or mechanical systems of sewage disposal. Some places in Saskatchewan already have by-laws prohibiting land spreading. Within the next five years, if it is allowed at all, land spreading must have an Environmental Protection Plan. Most provinces have discontinued the use of land-spreading.
2. **Building communities involves more than bricks and mortar.** It involves fostering a sense of belonging and ownership of the outcome of decisions. Various lake resorts shared that they use work bees, shared planning and honoring of volunteers as ways of engaging neighbors with one another.
3. **Encouraging law and order; living together peacefully.** The enforcement of by-laws drafted by the community is the responsibility of the community. The RCMP is rarely involved in the enforcement of local by-laws. Some communities have employed by-law enforcement officers. Lakeland RM uses an officer plus “doorknockers”, a notice that is hung on the door knobs of people who have broken local bylaws as a way of educating and reminding them of the by-laws.
4. **Protecting our eco-systems.** We need to be thinking of the pressures caused by house size, parking, docks, the size of boats and motors, ATVs, chemical control of weeds and raw sewage. Some resort communities have an Environmental Advisory Committee to look at the effect of intense development on the lake. Others have elected a representative to their local RM Council. The common area between our lots and the water belongs to the governing RM. If we want a say in the decisions that are made that have an impact on the lake, we need to be represented on the decision-making body. All cabin owners are eligible to vote in local elections. We want to avoid turning recreation into wreck-reation.

Things We Learned:

- The process of working on a community development plan for local issues is a critical step toward compliance. We need to have broad agreement before bylaws are put into place.
- Community building is an important part of life at the lake.
- We must have a go-forward plan for septic waste. The present system is time-limited and may have an unwanted environmental impact.
- We would benefit from having a representative on the RM Council. As a stop-gap alternative, someone from the community could attend RM meetings as an observer.
- A committee to consider the long-term impact of sustained development on the lake would be a benefit to all of us.
